

MISSION

The mission of the Mexican Cultural Institute of New York is to strengthen Mexico's image and foster a better understanding of the country through its arts and culture.

One of the main goals of the MCINY is to promote activities with a high and lasting impact among all the multiethnic and multicultural communities in New York City. In addition, the Institute aims to generate interest among the Mexican communities in the Tri-State area by presenting Mexico's most relevant artistic expressions ranging from the Pre-Columbian period to contemporary art.

















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Throughout my activities as Consul General, I am constantly impressed by the deep impact of Mexican culture in New York City. 
The works displayed in *Encounters* portray and document the dynamics of social practice and everyday life in Mexico.



SURVEYS, CANONS, AND CONTEMPORARY ART: A NEW LOOK AT 500 YEARS OF MEXICAN ART AND ARCHITECTURE

April 22nd Octavio Paz Gallery

In conjunction with the publication of his most recent book, *Art and Architecture in Mexico*, author James Oles offered a lecture on the process behind the first comprehensive survey of Mexican art in almost half a century. His presentation explored how surveys were previously crafted by art historians and museum curators. Rather than emphasize continuity over time, the book explores cross-generational connections; therefore, focusing primarily on the historical context –direct and indirect– that informs the work of some of Mexico's vibrant contemporary artists, such as Francis Alÿs, Melanie Smith, and Teresa Margolles.

BEYOND THE SUPERSQUARE

May 1st, 2014 – January 11th, 2015 Bronx Museum of the Arts Beyond the Supersquare explored the influence of Latin American and Caribbean modernist architecture on contemporary art. The exhibition featured over 30 artists and more than 60 artworks, in photography, video, sculpture, installation, and drawing. Their goal: to examine the complicated legacies of modernism through architecture. Beyond the Supersquare was curated by Holly Block (New York City) and María Inés Rodríguez (Colombia), and designed by Benedeta Monteverde (Mexico).






MEX POSTERS IN NY: CROSSCULTURAL POSTERS DESIGNED BY LUIS FITCH

Founded by Luis Fitch in 1999, UNO is considered to be Minnesota's first Hispanic branding agency. Luis, who was raised in Mexico and studied at the prestigious Art Center College of Design in Los Angeles, has a deep interest in traditional Mexican arts and culture. The exhibition at the Octavio Paz Gallery featured several of Luis's most successful design projects.









RECEPTION IN HONOR OF CURATOR PABLO LEÓN DE LA BARRA

The Mexican Cultural Institute of New York offered a reception to honor Pablo León de la Barra, Guggenheim UBS MAP Curator, Latin America. León de la Barra is currently in a two-year residency at the Guggenheim in New York. As part of his residency, he curated the exhibition Under the Same Sun: Art from Latin America Today, which was on view at the Guggenheim Museum from June 13th to October 4th, 2014.

July 1st — September 30th Press conference at the Consulate: July 1st Various locations



TRANSCOMMUNALITY: LAURA ANDERSON BARBATA, COLLABORATION BEYOND BORDERS

July 10th – August 31st Bric Gallery Transcommunality is a traveling exhibition that documents the decade-long project of Mexican-born, New York-based artist Laura Anderson Barbata on stilt-walking communities in Trinidad and Tobago, Mexico, and Brooklyn. The presentation at BRIC Gallery was the inaugural showing in the United States. It included approximately 60 pieces of over 20 towering dressed figures and 23 alebrijes (Mexican miniature wooden figures).



FROM WORD TO GAZE: FIGURES AND FIGURATIONS

September 11th – October 6th Octavio Paz Gallery From Word to Gaze: Figures and Figurations was part of a series of events presented by The Mexican Cultural Institute of New York in celebration of the birth centenary of writer, diplomat, and Nobel Laureate, Octavio Paz. This exhibit brought together more than thirty works by renowned painters of the 20th Century who were contemporaries of Paz and, in many cases, his friends. Works by Mexico's Gunther Gerzso, Maqbool Fida Husain from India, Spanish painter Antoni Tàpies, and Japanese-American Toshihiro Katayama, among many others, were displayed in the exhibition.



SEPTEMBER 18

LA FRONTERA, A PROJECT BY STEFAN FALKE

September 18th – 28th Photoville at Brooklyn Bridge Park

Photographer Stefan Falke's *La Frontera* project portrayed the cultural life of the border region between Mexico and the United States. The German photographer documented artists in border cities such as Tijuana, Mexicali, Nogales, Ciudad Juárez, Nuevo Laredo, Reynosa and Matamoros, spanning the entire 2000 mile physical divide. Over 180 skilled creators were assembled to demonstrate that the border region is much more than the sensationalism portrayed in the corporate media for ratings through depictions of violence. *La Frontera* was presented as part of the Photoville festival.

REGISTERING IS ALSO WRITING: AN ART BOOK EXHIBIT BY XIMENA PÉREZ-GROBET

Ximena Pérez-Grobet creates books as art objects. This exhibit, presented as part of the *Celebrate Mexico Now Festival*, depicted her unique vision through the artist's work produced over the last decade. On the show's opening night, a panel discussion was introduced about book art, language, art books, and the place they hold in the international art world.



NOVEMBER

NEW TERRITORIES: LABORATORIES FOR DESIGN, CRAFT AND ART IN LATIN AMERICA

November 4th, 2014 – April 5th, 2015 Museum of Arts and Design

New Territories explored the collaborations between small manufacturing operations and artisans, artists, and designers and showed how the resulting work addresses the issues of production, urbanization, displacement, and sustainability. Furthermore, it opened the dialogue between contemporary trends and artistic legacies in Latin American art, the blending of digital and traditional skills, and people's need to reclaim personal and public spaces.




NOVEMBER 1

JUAN SORIANO IN NEW YORK CITY: MONUMENTAL SCULPTURE AT DAG HAMMARSKJÖLD PLAZA

November 5th, 2014 - April 30th, 2015

Display of three sculptures by Juan Soriano at Dag Hammarskjöld Plaza (47th Street between 1st and 2nd Avenues), presented by NYC Parks' Art in the Parks program, The World Council of Peoples for the United Nations, The Consulate General of Mexico in New York, The Mexican Cultural Institute of New York, and the Fundación Juan Soriano y Marek Keller. Inspired by the popular and indigenous arts of Mexico, Cubism, and German Expressionism, *Pájaro III (Bird III)*, *Pájaro de Dos Caras (Bird with Two Faces)*, and *Paloma de Bronce (Bronze Dove)* bring Juan Soriano's unique perspective on art and society.








ANABELLA GONZALEZ DANCE THEATER


LARK SALON



FROM MEXICO TO THE WORLD: A CONVERSATION ABOUT TELENOVELAS

April 25th Octavio Paz Gallery

Mexican soap operas, or telenovelas, are not only widely watched in Mexico, but they are also a huge exportation product. During this program, Tanya Meléndez, Curator of Education and Public Programs of the Museum at the Fashion Institute of Technology, spoke about the role of fashion in Cuna de lobos, one of the most successful telenovelas of all time, screened in Mexico between 1986 and 1987. Aldo Sánchez gave a lecture on the widespread impact that Los ricos también lloran (1979-80) had in Russia. This soap opera became so popular that at one point it was aired on one of Russia's most prominent TV channels multiple times a day.



LATINBEAT FILM FESTIVAL

July 11th – 20th Lincoln Center

Each year, the Latinbeat Film Festival presents an exciting selection of Latin American cinema that combines personal, risk-taking works by emerging filmmakers with more traditional productions. In 2014, the festival presented three Mexican productions: *Paradise* (Mariana Chenillo, 2013), *We are Mari Pepa* (Samuel Kishi, 2013), and *The Searches* (José Luis Valle, 2013). All three directors were present at their film's screenings for Q&A sessions with the audience.

THE STRAY BULLET: WILLIAM BURROUGHS IN MEXICO, BY JORGE GARCÍA ROBLES

The Stray Bullet: William Burroughs in Mexico, published in English by the University of Minnesota Press, is an exciting account of Burroughs's formative experiences in Mexico. First published in Mexico in 1995, where it received the Malcolm Lowry literary essay award, this book by Jorge García-Robles makes no mistake that Mexico City was the place in which Burroughs embarked on his "fatal vocation as a writer." BOOK LAUNCH "DECEIT", BY JORGE VOLPI

Deceit, Jorge Volpi's most recent book, is a first-person narrative of a generation torn between risk and avarice that threw the world into one of the greatest economic—and human—disasters in recent memory. OCTOBER

AN HOMAGE TO OCTAVIO PAZ

October 1st – 8th Various locations

Octavio Paz, one of Mexico's most brilliant thinkers, was a prolific writer, journalist, and diplomat. Having traveled vastly around the world, he incorporated elements of several traditions into his prose and poetry. In addition to his literary work, Paz served as a diplomat in France and India, among other countries. After resigning from the diplomatic service in 1968, he continued his work in Mexico as an editor and publisher of the two magazines he founded: *Plural* and *Vuelta* (now *Letras Libres*).

Paz was awarded the Cervantes Award in 1981 and the Nobel Prize for Literature in 1990, among the many other prizes and recognitions that he received during his lifetime. To celebrate his life and works, The Mexican Cultural Institute of New York presented a tribute aimed to evoke Paz's thoughts. The multidisciplinary program included presentations of visual arts, music, poetry, and film.





October 1st

Conversation and screening at the Octavio Paz Gallery

As part of the exhibition *Figures and Figurations*, and as the opening event for the Octavio Paz program, Brian Nissen and Pablo Helguera held a conversation at the Gallery on October 1st. The event included the screening of Brian Nissen's *Mariposa de obsidiana*. The main topic of discussion was the relationship between Octavio Paz and visual arts.

Concert at St. Peter's Church: The city sails in the middle of the night

Silvia Navarrete (piano), Alejandra Gómez (mezzosoprano), and José Adán Pérez (baritone) performed the concert *The city sails in the middle of the night* at St. Peter's Church. Acclaimed writer and translator Eliot Weinberger and award-winning poets Coral Bracho and María Baranda discussed the Mexican poet's contribution to world culture and his strong role in the Mexican arts.

October 7th

Poetry Reading at Poets House

Octavio Paz believed that "to acknowledge the variety of visions and sensibilities is to preserve the richness of life". He ushered in a new era for Mexican literature and modern poetry. During this event, María Baranda, Coral Bracho, Nathalie Handal, Idra Novey, Kristin Prevallet, Roberto Tejada, Monica de la Torre, and Eliot Weinberger read fragments of his work, which spans over 60 years of writing.

October 8th


Film screening at the Cervantes Institute: I, The Worst of All

Based on Octavio Paz's essay, *The Traps of Faith*, this Argentine production explores the convent life of Sor Juana Inés de la Cruz, Mexican poet & intellectual, and emphasizes the challenges of living in an age that did not favor women as independent and talented individuals. 
GREAT VOICES OF MEXICO: ELENA PONIATOWSKA, JUAN VILLORO, SABINA BERMAN






MEXICO: THE COOKBOOK, BY MARGARITA CARRILLO ARRONTE






MEXICAN MONDAYS

A DAY OF THE DEAD OFRENDA FOR JULIA PASTRANA

October 27th — November 24th Octavio Paz Gallery

This year's ofrenda was dedicated to Julia Pastrana, (1834 – 1860) an indigenous Mexican woman born with hypertrichosis, who took part in 19th-century exhibition tours in North America and Europe. Pastrana's face and body were covered with straight black hair, her ears and nose were unusually large, and her teeth were irregular. She was a remarkably intelligent, art-inclined woman. In just a few years, Pastrana went from a largely poor, rural section of Mexico's Pacific Coast to New York and London, to Vienna and Berlin. In Moscow, in the winter of 1860, just days after giving birth to a baby boy, she passed away. Pastrana and her baby's bodies were exhibited throughout Europe for decades. It wasn't until last year that Pastrana's body was returned to Mexico. Laura Anderson Barbata, the Mexican-American artist that led the efforts to bring Pastrana home, coordinated our ofrenda.



MEMORIA VIVA: AN INTERNATIONAL ALTAR ROUTE

October 27th — November 9th Various locations

Memoria Viva · Altars Route is a cultural initiative that promotes the Mexican tradition of the Day of the Dead, a celebration of pre-Hispanic origin that over the centuries, has maintained its original purpose: to honor the deceased. The project has been held in Barcelona since 2007. In its 2014 edition, Memoria Viva expanded to Barcelona, Los Angeles, Madrid, Mexico City, Miami, and New York seeking to keep this beautiful tradition alive in the Mexican communities around the globe.
